
I mention this because I would encourage you to think about volunteering yourselves in the future when the current board members complete their terms.

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Games, Rules and Tournaments (Bill Hagel)

Understanding Local Rule E-5 Alternative to Stroke & Distance Relief

We've all done it. You hit a tee shot with your typical fade when a gust of left to right wind




turns it into a slice. As you strain your eyes to try to see your ball land, you notice the white stakes just beyond the row of tall muhly grass right of the cart path. Well prior to 2019, you probably told your playing partners/opponents, "I guess I got to hit a provisional" (of course, you duck hook your provisional shot – but that's a story for another day). Or, in an even worse scenario, you think you are in pretty good shape after your tee shot, only to get to where your ball should be and it's no where to be found. If you're playing MGA or some other tournament, you trudge back to the tee box to hit your 3rd shot under the judgmental stares of the next foursome who just arrived at the tee.

Well cheer up, the USGA in the 2019 new rules of golf has given us a gift that will keep us from having to make that walk of shame: Local Rule E-5. If you have a copy of the Rules of Golf provided by the USGA with your USGA membership, you won't find Local Rule E-5 in that publication. You would need the "Official Guide to the Rules of Golf", which contains the rules, rules interpretations, committee procedures and *model local rules*. Since E-5 is an *optional* local rule, it is up to each course if they will adopt it for play (it can be for the entire course or just certain holes). Happily, after a bit of gentle persuasion from the MGA Board, Cape Fear National has adopted Local Rule E-5 for all holes. However, if you are playing in a tournament at another course, such as the Interclub, you should ask if they have Local Rule E-5 in effect. Then ask someone else after braving the blank stares from the guy behind the counter.

How it Works

If your ball went out of bounds (OB) or after a 3-minute search it is lost anywhere on the course **EXCEPT** in a penalty area, you can do one of two things to keep playing (legally), 1) Take stroke and distance relief, or 2) Play under Local Rule E-5. It is important understand you cannot do both. If you hit a provisional ball, you forfeit your right to proceed under Local Rule E-5.



If Your Ball Goes OB

It must be known or virtually certain that your ball is OB. Known or virtually certain means you are 95-100 percent sure your ball went OB. So sure, that you can reasonably approximate where your ball last <u>crossed over</u> the edge of the OB boundary (not where your ball comes to rest OB, which may be closer to the hole). This is called your **Ball Reference Point**. From this Ball Reference Point, look for the point on the edge of the fairway (the fairway on the hole you're playing) that is

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
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nearest to the Ball Reference Point but not closer to the hole. That is the **Fairway Reference Point.** Now draw an imaginary line from the hole through the ball reference point and through the fairway reference point. Add two club lengths into the fairway, that is your relief area. You can now drop a ball anywhere is that relief area, but it will cost you two strokes. The diagram (right) will help you understand how to build that relief area.

If Your Ball is Lost


So, what do you do if your ball is lost on the course? Remember, Local Rule E-5 cannot be used if your ball is lost in a penalty area. If you can't find your ball after an exhaustive 3-minute search, you need to estimate the point on the



course where you think your ball is lost. That is your **Ball Reference Point**. Just as you did with *Page 6 of 13* the ball OB, look for the point on the edge of the fairway that is nearest to the Ball Reference Point but not closer to the hole that is the **Fairway Reference Point.** Draw that imaginary line again through both reference points and drop in the relief area (don't forget your two club lengths into the fairway, and oh yea – those two strokes). Here is another illustration to help you visualize it.

OB or Lost Ball Near the Green

Let's say you're a cool 125 yards to the hole. You swing an easy 9 iron and lift up just a hair at impact to see your skulled ball go clear over the green and OB (or lost in some really nasty scrub pine). How do you implement Local Rule E-5 in this situation? What is important to remember in this sitch is that you cannot drop the ball any closer to the hole. Estimate the distance from the hole to where you went OB (or where your ball was lost). Let's say that is approximately 30 yards. Then once again find the nearest fairway (on the same hole) and make sure you are no closer than 30 yards. This will result in a very large



relief area, so figure out what works best for you. You have to drop in the General Area, not on the putting green or in a bunker, as if you would. Again, here is a picture to help you visualize how to take this relief.

Local Rule E-5 should be a helpful tool to speed up play and keep us from having to go back to where we hit the previous shot to reload.

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InterClub Matches and North Brunswick

For those of you that are new to CFN and to refresh everyone else's memory matches are held monthly April through September, rotating among the six participating clubs of St. James Plantation, River Landing, Landfall, Porters Neck, Compass Pointe and Cape Fear National.

Twelve players plus one pro from each club make up the teams. The format is a two-man, best ball, match play competition using handicaps. One point is awarded to the winners of each nine plus one for the overall match. The selection of the CFN team that will represent CFN each month is done by a voluntary committee of four members selected by the Chairman. The selection committee will select the monthly teams based on how consistently you play to your handicap, your standing in the MGA Cup, and your participating in MGA events.

Teams will be announced two weeks ahead of the scheduled match

Teams will be paired by handicap from low to high. A cumulative point total will be kept with team recording the most points will be the 2019 ICI champ!

At each match the host club will run another tournament for gift certificate prizes. It will be played concurrently with the ICI matches and will be 2 net best balls of the foursome using 100% handicap. This is included in your \$60 entry fee.

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North Brunswick Cup

The NBC is a three-day competition between teams from CFN, Magnolia Greens and Compass Pointe. Participation is offered by invitation from the Team Captain and Head Professional from each club. The NBC team is made up of twelve players generally representing the lowest handicapped players from each club plus two alternates.

The format is based on the Stableford system with a quota. Play this year will be May 16 - 19 rotating among all three courses. This is a very competitive tournament, which has only recently been expanded to include the three neighboring clubs.







Handicap Committee (Jim Payne)

The MGA strives to maintain the integrity of the game through ones personal handicap

During the past year we have had a number of new MGA golf members and we on the Handicap Committee would like welcome you.

One of the reasons why golfers join the MGA is that it provides them with an opportunity to participate in the MGA organized competitions. All our competitions are gross and/or net (handicap) events, which is why we require that you have an established handicap (see the Pro shop) and enter/post all your scores in the handicap computer, or by using a mobile app on your device. Here are some basic handicap explanations:

<u>Handicap Index</u>: A Handicap Index is the number that indicates a player's skill and is taken to one decimal place (ex. 10.4). You might refer to your Index as your "raw" handicap. You never actually use this Index while playing; rather, you must first convert it using the slope of the specific set of tees you are playing in order to get a Course's Handicap. This will create a whole number, and this number is what makes your Handicap Index portable from course to course. You might need fewer strokes on an easier course and more strokes on a harder course.

You need to post at least five acceptable scores in order in order for a handicap index to be generated. We utilize the Golf Handicap and Information System (GHIN) program to compute our handicap index. GHIN will display a Trend number after five scores. It is not a handicap index, but your index can be computed using those five scores. Once your scoring record contains 20 scores, the best ten scores are automatically used to calculate the handicap index.

<u>Handicap</u>: This is the handicap you will play with at a particular course from a particular set of tees. It is based on the conversion of your USGA Handicap Index using the Course Handicap Table. These tables or the Slope Conversion Charts are available in any pro shop or are available on line.


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Equitable Stroke Control (ESC): ESC are rules wherein you are limited to posting a maximum number of strokes on any hole depending on your course handicap. ESC was established to ensure that a handicap is more representative of a player's potential ability. For example, a player with a course handicap of 11 has the misfortune of taking a 10 on a par 4. Under the rules of ESC, the player may post no more than a 7 on that hole, because a 10 is not a true indicator of his ability. If however, the player is playing in a "stroke Play" event; his tournament score must include the 10. The ESC formula is posted on the Handicap bulletin board in the Pro Shop.

Unfinished Holes and Conceded Strokes: A player who starts, but does not complete a hole must record "for handicap" purposes, the most likely score. For example, in a match, you have a 20-foot putt for a 4 on hole 10 and your opponent makes a 3. You pick up because you cannot better your opponent's score. You would record a X5 on the scorecard because a 5 would be your most likely score. There is no limit on the number of unfinished holes you may have in a round, provided you are not trying to manipulate you handicap.

<u>Scores to post</u>: You must post an 18 hole score if you play 13 or more holes. You must post a 9hole score if you play at least 7 holes. The above are just the basics on the Handicap process, but they will help to ensure you have an accurate handicap. Post higher scores than you are entitled, or do not post all of your scores, you run the risk of being labeled a "sandbagger" which per Google is "a derogatory term in golf that applies to golfers who cheat by pretending to be worse golfers than they really are." However, on the other end of the spectrum, if you post only your good scores, or scores that are lower than the actual score, you will have a "vanity" handicap which places your partners in a disadvantage.

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Treasurer's Report (John Lane)

The MGA's goal is to provide enjoyable experience camaraderie for the membership

The CFN MGA started this year with a carryover in the Operating Budget of **\$1,425** and an additional **\$75** in the Hole-In-One Club for a starting checking account balance of **\$1,500** for 2019.

So far this year the CFN has collected an additional **\$8,586** broken down as follows:

- \$7,200 paid in by 120 Members (New and Returning) at \$60/man.
- **\$1,125** paid in by the 45 men signed up to compete for the MGA Cup at \$25/man
- **\$261** paid in to the Hole-In-One Club

This all equals **\$10,086**, which is our balance as of February 27, 2019

During the MGA season we receive \$1 from the \$5 that is paid by each Member playing in the MGA event that week. If we have 25 MGA outings in the 2019 season with an average of 50 players then we would receive \$1,250 to add to the balance above; however,

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we keep the MGA Cup entry fees and the HIO (Hole In One) payments separate from the MGA Operating Budget since all of those monies are paid out to the competitors in the MGA Cup competition or the person(s) that get a Hole-In-One.

The MGA is about friendly competition and getting to know your neighbors better while learning the joys and the rules of golf. The MGA Operating Budget is well suited to provide funds for our Opening Day festivities on March 13 with lunch and a couple of drinks compliments of the CFN MGA. During the year the MGA will host Keg Days so Members can enjoy a couple of beers or fountain drinks and occasionally light appetizers.

We also allocate about \$5,500 to the MGA Annual Awards Banquet in December which last year covered the cost of the buffet and we provided wine (white and red) at each table. We usually budget for 100 attendees at the Annual Awards Banquet, which is also about the capacity for the Forest Restaurant, and about 90 guys attend every year.

While people are still signing up for the 2019 MGA season, as of February 22nd, there are 21 New Members included in the 120 guys that have signed up thus far and there are 35 Members from last year that have yet to sign up.

As usual there are some medical situations that require a recovery period so some are waiting to see when they will be able to get back on the course and we wish them all a speedy and safe recovery.

Thanks and I look forward to seeing you out on the course!
